

RULES

1. All entries must be submitted on paper no smaller than 8 by 10 inches, and no larger than 12 by 18 inches.
2. Entrants may use any art material in creating their entries, including, but not limited to, crayon, watercolor, magic marker, pen, ink, pencil and charcoal.
3. Entrants **may not** glue or attach anything to the entry. (We do not want pieces of the artwork to fall off in transit.)
4. All entries must depict the current year Law Day theme.
5. Entries must be submitted to the appropriate district representative and postmarked no later than April 9, 2010.
6. Each entry must contain the following information on the reverse side of the artwork:
 - (a) Student's full name
 - (b) Student's address and home telephone number
 - (c) Name of the student's school
 - (d) Student's grade level
7. Failure to abide by these rules will result in disqualification of the entry.

ABOUT LAW DAY

Law Day was first celebrated in 1958. Now, each May, state and local bar associations, in conjunction with the American Bar Association, sponsor Law Day programs around the country. The purpose of celebrating Law Day is two-fold: (1) to instill in students an appreciation for the law and foster a greater understanding of the American judicial system, and (2) provide an opportunity for attorneys to serve their local communities.

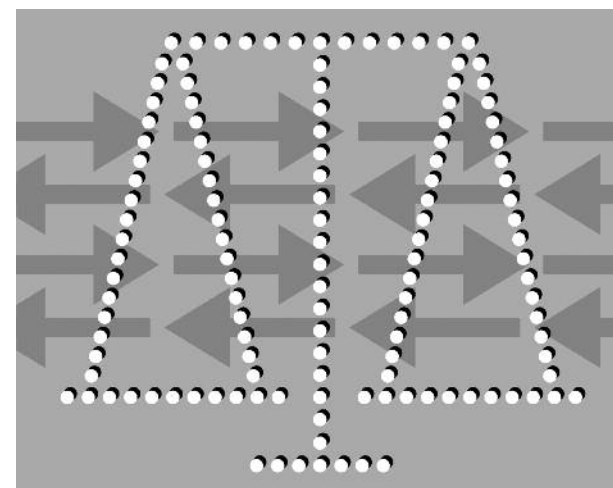

ANNOUNCING THE 2010 LAW DAY ART CONTEST

The 2010 Law Day Art Contest is sponsored by the Tennessee Bar Association Young Lawyers Division and is open to all Tennessee students in Kindergarten through 8th grade. The contest is a great way for students to creatively express their ideas about living in a society that is governed by the rule of law.

The 2010 competition theme, "Law in the 21st Century: Enduring Traditions, Emerging Challenges," provides an opportunity for students to consider how society can honor long-standing traditions in the law while addressing new issues and situations that might challenge "old ways" of doing things. As society stands on the threshold of a new decade, dramatic change is all around: economic markets have become global, business transactions now require cultural understanding and adaptation, populations are more mobile, and communication technologies erase miles and time zones. On a social level, issues such as human rights, criminal justice, intellectual property, dispute resolution, human migration and environmental regulation now affect not just nations but communities and individuals. Adapting to these new conditions may require that we become knowledgeable of other legal systems, acquire new cultural understandings, alter practices or even alter the law. In the midst of this change, however, it is important not to forget legal traditions that have endured the test of time. Students are asked to depict these concepts and how society can balance long-held traditions with changing realities.

The annual Law Day contest provides an opportunity for artists to achieve statewide recognition for their efforts. Whether teachers choose to incorporate the project into social studies or civics curriculum, or encourage students to submit pieces on their own, it is our hope that all Tennessee students will gain a greater appreciation for America's legal system and will be empowered to be active citizens.
